Philip J. Landrigan, M.D., M.Sc., is a pediatrician and epidemiologist. He is also a recognized leader in the fields of public health and preventive medicine. His research on lead poisoning in children helped persuade the U.S. government to pass stricter lead removal laws that have dramatically decreased the incidence of childhood lead poisoning in the last 25 years. Landrigan also helped develop the National Children's Study, the largest study of children's health and the environment ever launched in the United States. In addition, he was involved in the medical and epidemiologic studies that followed the destruction of the World Trade Center on September 11, 2001. Landrigan is professor and chair of the Department of Preventive Medicine at Mount Sinai in New York City.
