- Ashkenazi Jews have at least a 1 in 40 chance to carry a BRCA mutation

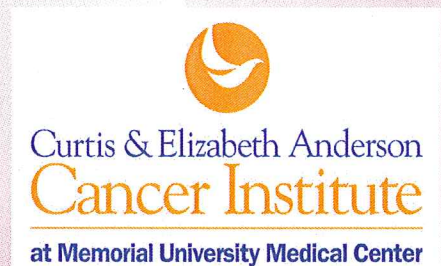
